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Mission & Vision Statement

Dissociative identity disorder (also known as multiple personality disorder) and other complex dissociative conditions are understandable and not uncommon long-term adverse effects following abuse, trauma and/or unhealthy attachment relationships with parental figures during early childhood. Frequently unrecognised by health, mental health and social care professionals and services people who experience such complex dissociative conditions rarely have access to appropriate treatment and support to facilitate their recovery. Trauma & abuse-related dissociative conditions, including the most complex - dissociative identity disorder - can be accurately diagnosed and are generally treatable. This makes the current situation of non-recognition and lack of appropriate services wholly inexcusable.

First Person Plural's mission is for ALL who are adversely affected by complex dissociative conditions to have free and easy access to a range of relevant specialist assessment, treatment, care and support services which offer the hope of recovery and an improved quality of life.

Our work is directed towards realising our vision of a society which:-

- Recognises that dissociative identity disorder and related complex dissociative conditions are long-term adverse effects of abuse, trauma and/or unhealthy attachment relationships with parent-figures during early childhood, and are not extremely rare or fictional problems;
- Provides local free-at-the-point-of-delivery access to specialist trauma & dissociation assessment and, sustained, effective treatment and support, for ALL those who may be at risk of, or are identified as having dissociative identity disorder or other trauma/abuse-related complex dissociative conditions;
- Provides informed support services for family, friends and carers of people who experience dissociative identity and other complex dissociative disorders;
- Acts to prevent dissociative identity disorder and other complex dissociative conditions through encouraging and supporting the healthy psychological & sociological development of ALL children and young people, in particular, by protecting them from sexual, physical, psychological or emotional abuse, neglect and unhealthy attachment relationships.

About First Person Plural

First Person Plural is a small UK national charity led by people with first hand experience of complex dissociative distress.

First Person Plural works to:

- to provide support and information to adult survivors of trauma and abuse who experience dissociative distress, and to their friends, family and carers (allies)
- to promote a better understanding of dissociative distress among health and social care professionals and to improve service provisions leading to better health outcomes
- to advance the education of the general public in order to promote a better understanding and acceptance of people who experience dissociative distress.

We do this by:-

- maintaining a membership which is open to adult survivors who have first hand experience of complex dissociative distress, to their allies, to interested professionals and to anyone else with an interest in our work;
- producing a quarterly support and information newsletter for our members;
- offering additional membership benefits e.g. members open meetings;
- maintaining an information web-site;
- organising and providing speakers and displays for conferences, training and awareness events;
- producing a comprehensive reading list and other information resources;
- maintaining national and international links with other organisations with similar aims and interests.

Ground-rules for safety, comfort & effective meeting

BE AWARE that just because a person you meet for the first time today is a member of First Person Plural and/or shares similar experiences to you does not automatically mean they are a safe person to give your personal contact details to.

Please do not be alarmed or offended by this advice. It simply means using the same common sense precautions you might take when meeting any stranger for the first time.

The AGM is a business meeting. Please behave appropriately and with due respect and courtesy for others

SELF and SYSTEM RESPONSIBILITY

We are each responsible for our own individual and, if applicable system-wide, behaviour and emotional & physical safety.

The same standards of behaviour and responsibility apply to each of us, whether we have an integrated sense of self or are living as a system of dissociated or multiple identities. Systems of identities will be collectively responsible for their whole system and for each individual system member who comes out during the meeting.

CONFIDENTIALITY

“Nothing about me, without me”

Personal information shared during this meeting should not be discussed or passed on to anyone who wasn't present when the person originally spoke

Even amongst those originally present personal information should not be further commented on or discussed outside the presence of the person who shared it.

Confidentiality applies both during the meeting and after we leave.

BEHAVIOUR

It is okay to do anything you like – leave the room, walk around, fall asleep etc. - as long as it is within these guidelines and does not interfere with the enjoyment of others. Behave responsibly, with consideration for others, just as you would want others to behave.

Any part, alter or other self of those who are living as a system of dissociated identities is welcome. However, behaviour must always be non-disruptive to others attending and appropriate to the activity in which you are participating. Remember that the AGM is a business meeting requiring adult behaviour and attention.

PARTICIPATION and INCLUSION

There may be opportunities to participate, the more you participate the more likely you will feel involved and included in the meeting. However, this should not feel like a pressure. It is fine for people to 'pass' on getting involved in conversations and discussions or on doing any activity. Being here, just listening to others, is participation enough.

We all need to help each other to participate. In particular, people who are more confident about speaking and being involved should remember to hold back at times to give others a chance.

RESPECT & NON-DISCRIMINATION

We all have our membership of First Person Plural or support for a member in common, which gives us some shared experiences and perspectives to speak from. However, we also acknowledge and respect that there are differences between us – including our backgrounds, knowledge, opinions, and wider life experiences. Whatever differences or disagreements arise we should treat each other respectfully as individuals. It is okay to respectfully disagree but we should avoid personal attacks and commonly recognised offensive or unfairly discriminatory language and behaviour. This particularly applies across the differences of gender, ethnic groups, survivorship experience etc.

Even if you feel strongly about an issue, think before you speak, choose your language with care. Any language or behaviour which is personally offensive to you can be pointed out, in the spirit of education, not criticism. However, it should be accepted that it may not be possible to please all of the people all of the time. E.g. some are offended by being referred to as 'multiple' but equally others present might be offended by the alternative 'dissociative'.

Be mindful of others' potential vulnerabilities as survivors but do not patronise through over-censoring your own respectful views to protect others. Remember we are each responsible for our own emotional safety.

Listen without interruption when others speak.

ACCESS & COMFORT

Speak up about any particular access needs you may have. For instance, if you need people to speak slower, softer, louder; or to avoid turning away from you when speaking; or if you can't see any of the displays or visual presentations.

Tell a member of the committee if there is anything about the venue or happening during the meeting which is causing you distress or discomfort. E.g. if it is too warm or too cold; if there is something triggering you or if someone is acting outside these guidelines etc. The committee will do what we can to address your concerns but please remember that some things will be outside our control.

SPEAKING ABOUT ABUSE

NO GRAPHIC OR DETAILED DESCRIPTIONS should be given of individual incidents or types of abuse. This includes expressions in artwork.

The same applies when speaking about self-harm or other particularly distressing or potentially triggering effects of abuse and dissociation.

SMOKING & REFRESHMENTS

The venue is an enclosed public space and as such it is illegal to smoke on the premises. The only scheduled break will be at lunch between the AGM and Executive Committee Meeting but smokers do not need permission to leave the meeting to go outside for a cigarette at anytime. Lunch and refreshments are not provided.

Minutes of First Person Plural's Fifth AGM 20/09/2008 held at Resource, Oxford

Welcome and Introductions

Melanie G chaired the meeting. She welcomed all attending and invited everyone to introduce themselves. The ground rules for safety, comfort and effective meetings were presented as an accurate record, given to all present and were read individually and agreed. The members were given the opportunity to suggest amendments or additional rules. The rules were agreed by all as already documented. All present expressed sincere gratitude and praise for the support given, the impressive growth and the success of FPP to Kathryn and Melanie. Kathryn said thanks were also due to present and previous members of FPP who had also contributed but were now either not involved at present or no longer had the need of the support from FPP.

Copies of the Annual Report and Accounts for the year ending 31st March, 2008 (prepared September 2008) were given out to all present.

Minutes of the last AGM:

Boo K proposed the minutes be adopted as an accurate record, Jacqui P seconded. Motion passed. No questions arose from the 2007 AGM minutes.

Thanks:

Kathryn said that Anna D could not unfortunately apply to be on the committee for 2008 but special thanks should be recorded for the very valuable work she has contributed to FPP over the last 2 years.

Trustees report: presented by Melanie G.

Melanie G asked the meeting to read her report before she commented upon it. A very comprehensive report was presented. It was noted that this year there was a need for an election in order to decide who was to be on the executive committee. This is a good sign of the growth of FPP as it shows that there is increased support and confidence from members.

There was a very good induction day and from that all executive committee meetings now start an hour earlier for training/induction issues.

The comprehensive amount of tasks completed on the Second year work programme, April 2007 to March 2008, were celebrated, especially the many training, awareness-raising, representation activities given.

Members were encouraged to promote FPP in as many ways as possible and to convince people of their need to know about DID. A discussion arose from this and ways were suggested and shared, e.g. details of FPP in doctors' surgeries, in libraries, given to psychiatrists, mental health tutors, universities, any other professionals that meeting might come into contact with or be aware of.

Melanie G gave the meeting opportunities to ask questions or make comments. No questions arose regarding the report. It was noted how hard the committee and Melanie and Kathryn had worked and how successful they had been. Kathryn and Melanie's dedication, commitment and professionalism were noted from the meeting, especially the very high standard of professionalism noted at all their training and awareness raising events.

A motion to enter the Trustees Report into the record was proposed by Boo K and seconded by Sue C.

Financial report and Accounts: presented by Kathryn L.

Kathryn L as Treasurer invited the meeting to read her report and study the accounts presented before making any comments or asking any questions on the details. A question was asked regarding the progress of applying for income through funding applications. Kathryn explained that this was still on the agenda but could only be addressed when the committee felt that it was the right time and they had the personal resources to deal with this large undertaking. It was still in the developmental stage. All tasks on the business plan necessitated taking members' personal health into account. Kathryn and Melanie received a donation of £1000 for FPP after their presentation in Amsterdam. She relayed this to her employer who immediately donated this money, proof again of the professionalism and positive impact their training gives. This £1000 will appear on the accounts of next year's report.

A motion to accept the Treasurer's Report and Accounts into the records was proposed by Karen B, seconded by Oriel W and carried unanimously.

Voting for the new executive committee

Kathryn thanked all previous committee members for their hard work and commitment. Prepared voting slips were given out to the meeting. A query was raised concerning the number of places for associated members. Kathryn explained that the constitution was changed at the last AGM so associated members could stand for roles of Treasurer, Chairperson, Secretary.

Kathryn L was appointed Secretary, Melanie G was appointed Chair, Mary P was appointed Treasurer. These 3 posts were uncontested. 9 members applied to be on the executive committee. Karen B, Boo K, Jacqui P and Sandra S were elected.

Trustees' Report to the Sixth Annual General Meeting of First Person Plural, 16 May 2009

I could try and make you believe that a whole year has passed since the last AGM and if you are like me you may well fall for it. In fact our last AGM was held in September 2008. We are holding this year's AGM in May to get us back on track. I have found it extremely difficult to write reports six months after the official end of our year. I am also going to keep it a lot less formal and cover some of what I consider to be the highlights of the last year.

After our last AGM we had the largest committee in the history of FPP with seven full members and four associate members. We have recently revised our constitution after a Special General Meeting. We became aware that to safe guard ongoing experience on the committee we needed to have some members stand down each year but still be able to nominate themselves for re-election. We also realised we needed more flexibility with the make-up of the committee while ensuring that we remain a survivor led organisation. We have achieved this and you can see the amendments to the constitution on our web-site.

We are really glad to have reached a membership of 150 this year our highest figure to date. This includes people from the Shetlands, Isle of Man, Jersey, Northern Ireland, England, Scotland & Wales as well as New Zealand.

Our training programme continues to be a very big part of the work we do. Kathryn and I have undertaken most of the work to date but several committee members have now shadowed or attended our training sessions over the year so hopefully as opportunities arise we will have a much bigger team to call on. The highlight of the year in this area has to be our two day visit to the Shetlands. We worked with mental health professional workers one day and were very privileged to be invited to attend the Survivors Group meeting on the second day. The visit has brought about real changes in the way the professionals are addressing Dissociative Disorders on the Islands. Working and support groups among the peer groups were established on the day and the feedback is they have continued and developed.

Kathryn continues to do her training sessions with trainee mental health nurses and other groups in the Wolverhampton area. I have started sessions with the mental health teams in the Waveney area in Norfolk/Suffolk.

In November FPP hosted a two day training programme in London. The first day was FPP's 'Understanding Dissociation' and the second day was 'Introduction to Dissociation in Children' presented by Renee Marks. Both days were well attended and thoroughly enjoyed. Renee's day was a delight and helped to make sense of why adopted children often have so many problems settling into their new family, believe it or not relating to 'past, unresolved trauma' and 'attachment issues'. Kathryn continues her work with the Wolverhampton Sexual Abuse Forum where dissociation is kept very much on the agenda.

The European Society for Trauma and Dissociation held their first, bi-annual conference in Amsterdam in April 2008. It was agreed to fully fund one member of

FPP and another member self-funded to attend this conference. We had our proposal accepted to present a 20 minute paper. It went very well and the English contingent were extremely supportive. There were over five hundred delegates from all parts of the world. It was a very intensive two days but I feel very lucky to have had the opportunity to be at the first ever ESTD conference. The next one is in 2010 in Belfast. On our return we were overwhelmed to receive an anonymous donation of £1,000 for FPP because of the paper we presented which highlighted the work we are doing. So a very big thank you to our benefactor.

We have held two Open Meetings during the year. The first in September followed the AGM and was an informal gathering in Oxford It was a beautiful day weather-wise and many of us spent time enjoying the sun and chatting. The second was in Brighton at the beginning of April 2009. Two committee members undertook to organise a structured day which was enjoyed by all attending although some members found it challenging as well as enjoyable. Jackie and Boo, the organisers, partners attended the day and ran a session for other partners. Although it was a small group I know from the feedback that they found it extremely useful. Hopefully this is the start of other members offering to organise an Open Meeting. If this is something you maybe interested in doing but not want to be on the committee please do contact us.

Valerie Sinason organised a Film Festival in London over four Sundays during the early summer of 2008. I represented FPP at two sessions, The Three Faces of Eve and May 33rd. Lia Williams, who starred in May 33rd and her husband who wrote it attended and answered questions after the showing. Lia said she had been unable to work for six months following the making of the film as she had been so affected by it.

We are now receiving quite a lot of enquiries to do with the media. Very few come to fruition although we try to follow each one up. At the moment FPP is working closely with a director/producer for Channel Four's Cutting Edge series. She is very determined to find a way of making a film that portrays the reality of living with DID without over dramatising it. It is proving to be a challenge but if she succeeds I think we will have a true representation of the subject.

FPP is involved with two national projects. One is working with the Police in putting together a mandatory programme for all trainee officers, on Mental Health issues, probably through e-learning and later hopefully a more specialised programme for those officers who require a more in depth understanding.

The second is SAVI UK- Sexual Abuse and Violence in the UK project. At the moment a feasibility study for a National study of the prevalence, experiences and resiliencies concerning sexual violence and abuse in the general population is being undertaken. A similar project has already taken place in Ireland and was considered to be successful.

Bunchy has taken over the job of producing the three times a year newsletter and thank her very much for taking on this task and wish her well with it.

Please do continue to send in articles, poems and art work. It can only come together as a proper newsletter if you continue to contribute to it. Also, many thanks to Kathryn for all the hard work that has gone into producing them over the last eleven years.

Necessary policies are gradually being written and likewise a questionnaire that we sincerely hope all members will complete. It will have many uses but one that may be of use to all members is to get a true picture of where people are getting therapy that they feel is helpful.

We hope to develop our links with tag to ensure that we all have access to the limited resources that are available in this area of work. Small steps are being taken to try and collate information on where people might be able to get respite care. This is in the very early stages but so important.

Once again I would like in my role of Chair to personally thank all the committee members who work so hard to take FPP's work forward.

**Treasurer's Report to the Sixth Annual General Meeting
of First Person Plural
16th May 2009**

Introduction

The income and expenditure accounts have been prepared using utilities within Microsoft Money 2002, the software programme which is used to maintain the association's financial records. I can confirm that data entry into the software was complete for the period covered by these accounts.

The final column gives the figures from 2007/8 accounts and is provided for comparison.

Income and Expenditure (Note that figures in brackets are negative amounts)

Income

Compared to last year, overall income has increased significantly this year, more than double! Congratulations go to Melanie and Kathryn for the very successful conferences held in London that resulted in the significant increase in delegate's fees. This reflects the success of the events and the appropriateness of the subject matter. They must also be congratulated on their very successful input at the ESTD conference in Amsterdam, so successful in fact that FPP was given a £1,000 donation from a delegate attending the conference.

Oriel must also be congratulated for obtaining a donation of £200 from the Quaker Society after she gave a talk on DID to her local branch. They were very moved by her presentation and content.

The membership subscription income has remained the same this year although actual membership numbers have risen. A number of new members have received hardship discounts, including an increased number of free memberships which are offered to those on means tested benefits.

The executive committee decided that the "You're Not Crazy and You're Not Alone" DVD would not be restocked for resale which explains the significant decrease in income from this source.

The income from Speaking Fees was up this year which is tremendous considering the amount of time and energy that was put into organising and delivering FPP's own events

Looking at ways to accumulate bank account interest is on the agenda for the next financial year.

There was no income received in the other income category.

Total funds available are the sum of the income generated during the financial year and the amount brought forward from the previous year. This amount brought forward represents our reserves.

Expenditure

When looking down the columns a very pleasing reduction in expenditure has occurred in general administration. This is largely due to those members who have agreed to have newsletters and/or other communication via email, thus resulting in lower posting/photo-copying expenses. However, only two of the scheduled 3 issues of the newsletter were distributed during the period of these accounts which is also a contributing factor to the reduced spending in this category.

There was a surplus of stationary purchased in the previous year resulting in less needing to be spent this year.

Volunteer travel expenses halved this year. This was more due to the generosity of volunteers, several of whom did not claim expenses, rather than a reduction in volunteer activity. In fact, more volunteers are undertaking more activities on behalf of First Person Plural than in previous years.

For one of the very successful London trainings an outside speaker was bought in which is why expenditure on this item has risen.

Members travel and subsistence has risen which is very pleasing as it means that more members of FPP have been enabled to attend meetings and open days. However, it should also be noted that the majority of members attending events continue to fund their own travel etc. FPP only refunds members expenses by prior agreement to those who cannot otherwise afford to attend.

It is important for FPP to be represented at other major events and spread the word so expenditure on conference fees has risen this year. Most of this expenditure is advance fees paid for the attendance of two representatives who will be contributing to the FPP workshop at the TAG/RAINS residential conference in late May 2009. At least 3 other FPP representatives who will be contributing to the FPP workshop and/or information display at this conference have secured funding from elsewhere or are self-funding their attendance.

Venue and catering expenditure has risen considerably this year mainly because of the London events. The value in raising awareness of FPP and the issues FPP wants to bring into the wider public arena far outweigh the financial costs and, in any case, delegate fees received in income from these events offset this expenditure to some degree.

Summary

The in-year income has been greater than the in-year expenses which is an improvement on last year when there was a deficit.

The reserves we carry forward into the next financial year is £5, 151.91, just under a £1,000 more than last year and again is not an unhealthy figure for an organisation of FPP's nature, size and activities. However, we should continue to aim to cover all in-year expenditure with in-year income and, when possible, seek to build up our reserves.

Income is below the threshold for mandatory audit or independent review of our accounts.

I confirm that to the best of my knowledge the accounts presented here represent an accurate and complete record of income and expenditure for the period 1st April 2008 to 31st March 2009.

I would like to thank Kathryn L for her invaluable support and guidance in my role as treasurer this year. She has been greatly appreciated.
